Internationally-Oriented Courses for IBA programs in LA&PS

Internationally-oriented courses are defined as postsecondary courses with international content or perspective that is integrated into the teaching and learning material.

Degree Requirement:

12 credits outside the student's IBA major (if enrolled as of 2014-15 and prior) 9 credits outside the student's IBA major (2015-16 changes approved by York Senate)

Criteria to select an internationally-oriented course:

- Consider academic content with an international dimension and contemporary subject matter (since the 1800s) in topics that include, but are not limited to globalization, international inequalities, cultural and linguistic diversity, international development, intercultural learning and cross-cultural communication. Exceptions may be entertained subject to the approval of the Undergraduate Program Director/IBA coordinator
- Consider interdisciplinary courses with subject matter related to the countries associated with the language study acquired in IBA
- Consider educational activities, granted for credit, that involve experiential learning outside the classroom in an international location (i.e. *YorkU Abroad course*)
- Consider a research abroad project (taken for credit) carried out by a student in a country outside the home institution (i.e. *directed reading*). The project must be arranged by the student with a faculty supervisor

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS:

AP/ANTH 1120	6.0	Making Sense of a Changing World: Anthropology Today

Course Description:

Anthropology is the comparative analysis of the human condition. This course challenges you to engage with other ways of knowing and being, and to rethink your taken-for-granted knowledge and beliefs; to see the world the way other cultures do. Through the course students will use anthropological approaches to increase an understanding of global issues in diverse locales. Course credit exclusions: AP/ANTH 1110 6.00, AP/ANTH 1130 6.00.

AP/ANTH 2100 6.0 From Empire to Globalization: Anthropological Perspectives	Globalization: Anthropological Perspectives
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Course Description:

This course analyzes and critiques the social and cultural foundations of historical and contemporary forms of capitalism, development and globalization from an anthropological perspective. As part of this critique we examine forms of on-the-ground resistance around the world. Course credit exclusions: AP/ANTH 2100 3.00, AP/ANTH 2100 6.00 (prior to Fall 2012). PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AS/ANTH 2100 6.00.

AP/ANTH 2120	6.0	Visualizing Ourselves, Visualizing Others: Media Representation &
		Culture

Course Description:

This course interrogates the relationship between media and culture. It focuses on media representations in different cultural contexts in order to develop critical analytical skills for understanding the processes through which identities and social inequalities are produced, contested and transformed.

AP/ANTH 2170	6.0	Sex, Gender & the Body: Cross-Cultural Approaches to the Body,

Course Description:

This course critically examines popular explanations of what is considered natural (and what is not) about sex, gender, the body and the family. Through a cross-cultural approach, biological models of natural gender roles, as well as sexual and familial relations, are explored and questioned. Course credit exclusions: AP/ANTH 2170 6.00

AP/ANTH 3110	6.0	Acquiring Research Skills (YorkU Summer Abroad)
Course Description		

Course Description:

This course will provide students with a theoretical and practical toolbox for designing, conducting, and writing ethnographic research projects. Students will explore the concepts and skills in class and then apply and develop them in the field. Students will have the opportunity to design a research project in consultation with the instructor, and to conduct their own ethnographic fieldwork during an intensive four-week research trip to another country.

PREREQUISITES: Anthropology students - Successful completion of AP/ANTH 1110 OR AP/ANTH 1120 AND Successful completion of a minimum of one 2000-level Anthropology course Sociology students -Successful completion of AP/SOCI 2030 6.00 and AP/SOCI 2040 6.00 NOTE: If you do not meet the prerequisites, please seek permission from course director PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Prerequisite: AS/ANTH 1110 6.00 and a minimum of one 2000 level anthropology course. Course Credit Exclusion: AS/ANTH 3110 6.00.

AP/ANTH 3120 6.0 The Anthropology of Tourism
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Course Description:

This course explores the sites/sights of tourist practice. Beginning with an historical analysis of tourism in relationship to European colonial expansion, we then consider the cultural significance of contemporary tourism both at home and abroad. Course credit exclusions: AP/ANTH 3010B 6.00. PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AS/ANTH 3010B 6.00 and AS/ANTH 3120 6.0

AP/ANTH 3410 6.0		Critical Perspectives on Ethnicity and Nationalism
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Course Description:

This course examines the significance and perception of ethnicity and of nationalism, both as concepts and as modes of establishing or of manipulating identity and of organizing social life in non-Western societies. Course credit exclusion: AP/ANTH 3410 6.00 (prior to term Fall 2012). PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AS/ANTH 3410 6.00.

AP/ARB 2700	6.0	Introduction to Arabic Culture		

Course Description:

This course presents textual sources in Arabic literature, philosophy and scripture, and is designed to introduce students to major aspects of Arabic and Islamic culture from the classical to the modern period. Course credit exclusions: None. Note: Knowledge of Arabic is desirable, but not required. PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusion: AS/ARB 2700 6.00.

AP/CH 2030	6.0	Intermediate Chinese Language and Culture in China (YorkU Summer
		Abroad)

Course Description:

An intensive intermediate Chinese language and culture course, taught on the York campus and followed by a stay at Fudan University in Shanghai, China. The course covers language structures and functions, vocabulary and topics on Chinese culture and civilization. This course is taught in Chinese. The course will be offered in the summer session only. Four weeks on York University campus: six hours weekly (three hours twice weekly, in evenings) followed by three weeks in Shanghai, China; Five contact hours daily, plus excursions.

Prerequisite: AP/CH 1000 6.00, or permission of the department. Course credit exclusion: AP/CH 2000 6.00.

AP/CH 3790/91	6.0	Contemporary Chinese Culture Through Literary Texts and Film
		(Course 3791 is - In Translation)

Course Description:

This course explores the relationship between ideology and art. Focusing on such aspects as narrative technique and allegory and by investigating the film versions of some of the literary texts under discussion, this course offers insights into contemporary China. Course credit exclusion: AP/CH 3791 6.00. PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AS/CH 3790 6.00 and AS/CH 3791 6.00

AP/COMN 3770	3.0	Transnational Media Culture and Global Youth

Course Description:

The aim of this course is to provide students with an overview of the critical debates and issues surrounding youth media culture in a transnational context. This course will trace the impact of the transnational mobility and ubiquity of media such as film, television, music, mobile technologies, video



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games and the internet, on the proliferation of global youth cultures. The course will explore the emergence of complex forms of hybrid cultures and identities that increasingly occur amongst young people throughout the world. At the basis of the course will be a critical analysis of the construction of youth including the multiple, diverse constructions across a range of cultures. Course credit exclusions: None.

AP/LCON 3133 3.0 Approaches to Global Economics (writing)	AP/ECON 3199	3.0	Approaches to Global Economics (writing)
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Course Description:

Explores approaches to the global economy, emphasizing structural and policy-related aspects. Course credit exclusions: AP/ECON 3190 3.00, AP/POLS 3270 3.00, AP/POLS 3275 3.00.

PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AK/POLS 3700 6.00, AS/ECON 3190 3.00, AS/ECON 3199 3.00, AS/POLS 3270 3.00, AS/POLS 3275 3.00

AP/ECON 3473	3.0	Global Business Economics
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Course Description:

Deals with international business decision-making and includes concepts of international trade and finance, strategy, marketing, and the international "rules of the road" that are the responsibility of such organizations as the WTO and IMF. Brings together insights from economics, strategy, and finance to address the challenges of international business economics, including the theory of transactions costs applied to global outsourcing.

Prerequisite: AP/ECON 2400 3.00 or equivalent. Course credit exclusions: None.

PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusion: AK/ECON 3473 3.00.

AP/ECON 5550/5559 5.0 Economic drowin & Development (writing)	AP/ECON 3550/3559 3.0	Economic Growth	& Development (writing)
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Course Description:

Studies the economic problems of poor countries and poor communities. Explores the meaning of development by considering the characteristics of economic underdevelopment, poverty, income and wealth distribution, rural versus urban development, population growth, and unemployment and migration. Additional topics include theories of development, growth and technological change, strategies for environmentally sustainable development, education, and health.

Prerequisites: AP/ECON 1000 3.00 and AP/ECON 1010 3.00 or equivalents. Course credit exclusions: GL/ECON/ILST 3920 3.00, AP/ECON 3550 3.00.

PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AK/ECON 3550 3.00, AS/ECON 3310 3.00.

AP/ECON 3569	3.0	Economic Policy in Developing Countries

Course Description:

Examines policy issues arising from development planning. Topics include agriculture versus industry, international trade, monetary and fiscal policies, foreign investment, foreign aid and self-reliance, and global issues.

Prerequisites: AP/ECON 1000 3.00 and AP/ECON 1010 3.00 or equivalents. Course credit exclusions: AP/ECON 3560 3.00, AP/PPAS 3560 3.00.

AP/EN 3175	3.0	Travel Writing in English
Course Description:		

Course Description:

Dealing with 19th- and 20th-century travel writing (British, Canadian, American, African, Asian and Caribbean), this course examines the construction of a travelling/narrating self, its representations of



other landscapes, cultures and peoples and the writer's rhetorical strategies. Course credit exclusion: AP/EN 2305 3.00 (prior to Fall 2011). PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusion: AS/EN 2260 3.00.

AP/EN 3592 6.0	Literary London (YorkU Summer Abroad)
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Course Description:

London has been an inspiration, both negative and positive, for generations of British writers. This course, taught in the classroom at York and in London itself, investigates how an understanding of the many facets of the city can transform our understanding of its literature. Readings will address the abundant variety of experiences London has offered and still offers its writers.

The course will be offered in the summer session only. Three weeks on York University campus, followed by three weeks in London, England.

Prerequisites: None Course credit exclusions: None

AP/FR 3089	6.0	French Language and Society (YorkU Summer Abroad)
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Course Description:

An intensive French language and society course, taught at York University (two weeks) and at l'Université de Savoie in Chambéry, France (four weeks). This course offers students a unique opportunity to gain six credits at the 3000 level through the intensive study of French in a Frenchspeaking milieu. Language of instruction is in French. The course will be offered in the summer session only.

PREREQUISITES: AP/FR 2081 3.0 and AP/FR 2082 3.0

AP/GEOG 1000	6.0	Introduction to World Geography
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Course Description:

This course explores geographic approaches to disparities of cultural, economic, political and environmental development in major world regions comprising developed capitalist and socialist countries and underdeveloped nations. Course credit exclusion: None. Prior TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusion: AS/GEOG 1000 6.00.

AP/GEOG 1410	6.0	Human Geography

Course Description:

An introduction to the study of human geography which puts emphasis on geographical aspects of population, culture, society and economy. Detailed examples are studied in tutorials. Course credit exclusion: None. Prior TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AS/GEOG 1410 6.00 and AK/GEOG 2500 6.00.

AP/GEOG 2030	3.0	The End of the Earth as We Know It: Global Environmental Change

Course Description:

This course explores how human society has transformed the earth system and investigates the social, economic and political implications of contemporary environmental change. Topics include deforestation, climate change, biodiversity loss and natural disasters such as hurricanes, flooding and drought. Internet access is required. Recommended prerequisites: AP/GEOG 1000 6.00, AP/GEOG 1400 6.00 and AP/GEOG 1410 6.00. Course credit exclusions: None. Prior TO FALL 2009: Recommended prerequisites: AS/GEOG 1000 6.00, AS/GEOG 1400 6.00 and AS/GEOG 1410 6.00. Course credit exclusion: AS/GEOG 1400 6.00 and AS/GEOG 1410 6.00. Course credit exclusion: AS/GEOG 2030 3.00.

AP/GEOG 2070 3.0 Empire, State and Power: Introduction to Political Geography

This course explores the reciprocal links between geography and political processes at the global, national and local levels. Political geography asks us to understand the historical and contemporary relationships between power and space, focusing on empires, nations, states, territory, and borders. More broadly, the course highlights the importance of space and place for processes of domination. Course credit exclusions: AP/GEOG 2050 6.00 (prior to Fall 2013), AP/GEOG 2070 3.00 (prior to Fall 2013). PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusion: AS/GEOG 2070 3.00.

	6.0	Urban Geography
AP/GEOG 2220	60	Urhan Geography

Course Description:

In a world where over 50 per cent of the population lives in urban areas, cities play a significant role in shaping the social, cultural, economic, political, and environmental conditions of people's everyday lives. This course introduces the geographical literature on the urbanization process in historical and contemporary perspective. It provides students with a necessary general survey of the characteristics of urban processes and patterns, urban systems and structure, and urban social issues from a geographical perspective. Course credit exclusions: None. PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusions: AS/GEOG 3120 6.00 and AK/GEOG 3430 6.00.

AP/	GEOG 3060	3.0	Post-Colonial Geographies	
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Course Description:

This course examines the particular landscapes produced by colonialism and the struggles to move beyond it. Attention is paid to the use of space and place as mechanisms of control and liberation. Examples are international, and concern fictional and non-fictional landscapes. Prerequisite: 54 credits successfully completed. Course credit exclusions: None. PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Prerequisite: 54 credits successfully completed. Course credit exclusion: AS/GEOG 3060 3.00.

	AP/GEOG 3130	3.0	The Global Economy	
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Course Description:

This course examines the evolution of the world economy as well as the major institutions that have supported it, and interprets the new geography of investment, production and consumption that accompanies it. Course credit exclusions: None. PRIOR TO FALL 2009: Course credit exclusion: AS/GEOG 3130 3.00.

AP/GEOG 4521	6.0	Field Studies in Human Geography (YorkU Summer Abroad)

Course Description:

This course introduces students to geographic filed studies by bringing traditional classroom learning into the field through a combination of pre-departure seminars and an extended trip to allocation away from the University. The specific topic for this course is Community Development and Environments in Thailand. During the fieldtrip, students will learn about geographical issues through observation, participation, discussions, and lectures, while reflecting critically on fieldwork. During the fieldtrip, students will learn about community-based environmental conservation and development, through visits to four field sites. In each of these sites they will observe community development processes, interview community members (group interviews with the assistance of translators), and listen to guest lectures by local experts. Language of instruction is English. The course will be offered in the summer session only. One week on York University campus, followed by three weeks in Chiangmai, Thailand.

PREREQUISITES: AP/GEOG 1000 6.0 (or AP/GEOG 1410 6.0) and completion of 86 credits; or written permission by Course Director

AP/GER 2020	6.0	Intermediate German in Berlin (YorkU Summer Abroad)

This course introduces some of the major German-language writers and works of the 20th and 21st centuries. Applies various approaches to establish the historical conditions under which these texts were produced and to discuss the particular pressures and concerns to which they represent a response. Writers may include Nietzsche, Freud, Mann, Kafka, Brecht, Zweig, Benjamin, Bachmann, Wolf, Schlink and Sebald.

Course Description:

Applies various approaches to establish the historical conditions under which these texts were produced and to discuss the particular pressures and concerns to which they represent a response. Writers may include Nietzsche, Freud, Mann, Kafka, Brecht, Zweig, Benjamin, Bachmann, Wolf, Schlink and Sebald.

Course credit exclusions: AP/GER 2200 6.00, AP/GER 2201 6.00 (prior to Fall 2010), AP/GER 4200 6.00. Note: No knowledge of German is necessary. AP/GER 3200 6.00 will count for major or minor credit towards the German culture and society stream in the German studies program, but will not count for major or minor credit towards the German language, literature and culture stream in the German studies program.

AP/GER 3989	6.0	Germany and the Global Imaginary
(cross-listed with		
AP/HUMA 3989)		

Course Description:

Investigates the international cultural, artistic, intellectual, and social links that have informed German self-definition and the German imagination of spaces and peoples beyond the German-speaking world. Considers how this international exchange has influenced cultural production in a variety of media, such as literature, film, visual arts, music, architecture and theatre. Course credit exclusions: None.

AP/GKM 3600	6.0	Modern Greek Literature and Culture After Independence
Course Description:		

A general survey of the development of Greek literature and culture from the early 19th century, as they related to contemporary Greek consciousness. Further practice and study of modern Greek. AP/SP 2020	6.0	Intermediate Spanish Abroad (YorkU Summer Abroad)

Course Description:

This course involves the intensive study of the Spanish language at the intermediate level as well as of the culture of the Spanish-speaking country of immersion, four weeks at York University and four weeks in the Spanish-language locale. Interaction with native speakers through cultural activities and excursions complements in-class development of listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills through written exercises, compositions, oral presentations, and conversations. Course materials highlight the history and socio-cultural context of the destination country.

Prerequisites: AP/SP 1000 6.00 or Permission of the Program Course credit exclusions: AP/SP 1050 6.00, AP/SP 2000 6.00, AP/SP 2010 6.00, GL/SP 1520 6.00.
